FIRST students, being the marvelous human beings that they are, put together one of the most massive outpourings of gracious professionalism seen at a competition, and worked with the Chilean team to build a bot that actually competed. It was fabulous to witness! A couple of years ago, a student from this Chilean team caught up with my husband and I at a world championship event, proudly sharing a prototype of a prosthetic hand he built.
